1. Call to Order/Roll Call/Pledge of Allegiance

Council members Garcia, Kopitar, Mason, Stevenson Tremaine, and Zumwalt were present.

Others present: Mr. Ed Diokno of Supervisor Glover's office, Deputy Ken Marchese, Deputy Kevin Briggs, and Lt. Paul O'Mary of the Sheriff's Dept., Ms. Leslie-Anne Palaroan from Habitat for Humanity, Mr. Willie Scott from Bay Point Community All-N-One, Inc., Ms. Tracy Craig of Craig Communications, and Mr. Ben LePage of PG&E, regarding PG&E/Shell Pond clean-up.

Pledge of Allegiance: led by Ms. Leslie-Anne Palaroan

Chairman Tremaine stated most of the time this is done earlier in the year, but at this time he wanted to welcome the new members of the MAC and say good-bye to an existing member; he asked if Ms. Terrilynn Kopitar if she had any departing remarks.

Ms. Kopitar stated she's had a wonderful time being on the MAC and serving Supervisor Glover's office. She stated she's also pleased with the selection of the new MAC members; Supervisor Glover made great choices, and she looks forward to seeing them work on the MAC. Ms. Kopitar stated to keep her mind if there is ever an opening on the MAC she would be willing to serve again

Council members Zumwalt, Stevenson, and Eva Garcia all shared their thanks and appreciation of Ms. Kopitar's dedication to the community and work done while serving on the MAC.

Chairman Tremaine asked new members, Ms. Trina Hudson and Ms. Lupe Garcia, to take their seats at the dais and asked them to say something about themselves.

Councilwoman Hudson stated she is so excited; that she has lived here many years and admired what the Council has done. She stated she's looking forward to helping out in any way she can.

Councilwoman Lupe Garcia stated she wanted to say thank you, and that she is very honored to have been chosen; that she is looking forward to being here to help.

Chairman Tremaine stated that on behalf of everyone of the council, "Welcome".

2. Approval of May 7, 2013 Agenda

Motion made by Councilwoman Mason to approve the May 7, 2013 agenda. Seconded by Councilwoman Garcia. Motion carried 7 – 0; Council Members E. Garcia, L. Garcia, Hudson, Mason, Stevenson, Tremaine and Zumwalt voting 'yes'.

3. Consent items

- a. Approval of monthly Recording Secretary invoice for \$120.00**
- b. Approval of Record of Actions of April 2, 2013**

Motion made by Councilwoman Zumwalt to approve Consent Items. Seconded by Councilman Stevenson. Motion carried 7 – 0; Council Members E. Garcia, L. Garcia, Hudson, Mason, Stevenson, Tremaine and Zumwalt voting 'yes'.

4. Public Comments:

Mr. Mark Sullivan shared photos with the Council and stated he lives on Bella Vista Ave, has been there over 25 years, and is here to address some problems that are continuing on the corner of Willow Pass and Bella Vista on the vacant lot. He stated as Chairperson of the Public Safety Task Force, they tried for 7 years to get County to come up with a solution for that lot, because every solution the Task Force offered had been stomped on. Mr. Sullivan stated there are 20 – 30 people there every day on that lot drinking, urinating, etc.; it starts in the morning, even on Sundays, and goes all day long. He stated they block the road, take over the lot, and continuously rummage through a donation box at La Chicana leaving a mess and strewing clothes and garbage all throughout the neighborhood. Mr. Sullivan stated he wants to see a united effort from the Sheriff's Dept., county, and Supervisor Glover's office to resolve this problem.

Chairman Tremaine suggested Mr. Sullivan attend a Code Enforcement meeting to share his concerns too.

After Mr. Sullivan shared he is unable to attend meetings during the day, Councilwoman Mason stated she would attend the next one and share his concerns; Chairman Tremaine stated he would share the concern also at the next code meeting.

Mr. Michael Kerr stated he wasn't speaking on the homeless issue, but he hoped they weren't going to be blamed for all the problems at the vacant lot; it is a state and national disaster because of the lack of health service available for them, and an economy where people can't get jobs.

Mr. Kerr stated that he wanted to speak about recent community meetings held by ACCE where they had a translation machine for Hispanic, or probably any language; he stated it was a really neat machine with wireless headphones for listeners to have a good understanding of what is going on. Mr. Kerr recommends that the MAC and the Park District get together and apply for Keller Canyon Grant money to buy one of these machines; you would also have to hire a translator to speak into the device, or get some volunteers from the community.

Mr. Kerr stated lastly that the Ambrose garden is now being run as an open garden instead of renting boxes; they only have 2 people currently using a box. He stated instead it is open for people to come in and pick some vegetables, hopefully allowing him to train them to pick correctly, and in exchange put in some work at the garden. Mr. Kerr thanked Supervisor Glover for the Keller money to build the fence; will be building a storage shed soon, and also thanked the Park District for their help in giving the land and water to run the garden.

5. Agency Reports. The MAC received the following reports:

a. California State Highway Patrol – Officer Eric Brewer

b. Contra Costa County Sheriff's Department – Lt. Paul O'Mary

Deputy Briggs stated he was speaking first before Lt. O'Mary's presentation as he wanted to bring something before the council for consideration. He stated he had approached Councilwoman Hudson as well. Deputy Briggs stated historically Neighborhood Watch programs have always been law enforcement oriented; the problem with that being the first position to be eliminated in hard times is the Crime Prevention Specialist. He stated what ends up happening are those Neighborhood Watch programs fall apart. Mr. Briggs stated he would like to propose is that a MAC member becomes the liaison between the community and the Sheriff's Dept. so in those lean times when there is not Crime Prevention Specialist, the Neighborhood Watch programs continue. Deputy Briggs stated Mr. Wickers of the Bay Point Vision Safety Committee was here as well and in the process of working together too. He stated the ideal goal would be that between the Sheriff's Dept. and the Bay Point Safety Group they would be able to present different Block Captains in different meetings through the MAC liaison; maybe Councilwoman Hudson; basically covered and controlled through the MAC.

There was a short discussion regarding current Neighborhood Watch programs, and Deputy Briggs' goals for National Night Out in August this year.

After a short discussion it was decided to place on next month's agenda an action item

regarding creation of a new Neighborhood Watch Committee and members.

Lt. Paul O'Mary distributed copies of the Bay Point MAC's Monthly Sheriff's Report for April and stated as far as activity in Bay Point he was happy to report that the Crime Stats are at an 8 year all time low. Lt. O'Mary stated there had been a couple of gang related drive-by shootings in the last couple of weeks, but overall the crime rate is down, thanks to his officers, some different programs, other resources, and the community.

Lt. O'Mary stated the Bay Point homeless issue had been brought up earlier; there is a problem throughout Contra Costa County. He stated when he was a patrol officer here they would tolerate the encampments to a certain degree, because it is understood that circumstances for some are beyond their control, but when it becomes such a nuisance they had to move them along; that's all they did was move them along into someone else's jurisdiction and they left behind all their mess, basically circling them around the county. Lt. O'Mary stated when he came back to Muir Station as Commander he realized the homeless problem was still here, made some phone calls, talked to some folks and found out there was a protocol being looked at; Lt. Robin Heinemann from Concord had taken it upon herself to start putting together a protocol standard for all law enforcement. Lt. O'Mary shared a PowerPoint presentation of the proposed Homeless Protocol including:

- Some pieces will be changed or adapted – presented at another Town Hall meeting where many good ideas were shared and will be considered to better the program
- Problems accompanying homeless encampments – public health hazard, blight, litter, crimes both on and by homeless, drugs, refusal to go to shelters, mental health, etc.
- Protocol includes outreach program – with this in place people within the county, Health Services (including mental health), Public Works, Sheriff's Dept. and local outreach programs are required to do their job.
- Encouraging homeless individuals to accept these services to move forward in their lives and not remain stagnant.
- Insure clean-up of abandoned encampments.
- Someone reports homeless encampment to local law enforcement, they will in turn go out to encampment to document and take pictures, assess any immediate dangers, post a 72 hour notice to vacate, contacting county Health Services, and contacting other county agencies needed to go to encampment and offer services.
- After 72 hours they will respond back have anybody that is left moved along or be arrested, and any belongings left behind of value will be kept and stored at a designated storage unit where the homeless have a certain amount of time to claim. Most of the time there is nothing of value left behind.

Councilwoman Zumwalt asked about property owners being responsible for clean-up costs if it is on private property, and L. O'Mary stated that was true; there was a discussion regarding time limits and exact limits have not yet been set.

Lt. O'Mary stated this is still in the works, it isn't a final project, but in the meantime to contact the Sheriff's to report even suspected homeless encampments.

Lt. O'Mary stated protocol had been proposed before and had some steam but unfortunately the economy took a dive, along with everyone's staffing levels, and attention was diverted from this program to others needs; it got put on back burner. He stated in talking to Lt. Heinemann, she feels it's getting momentum again; that it will need to be presented to the Chief of Police Association of Contra Costa County to be signed off on, and then it would be presented to local jurisdictions to make sure everyone is on board in the county. Lt. O'Mary stated the caveat to this is that if it is not approved, they are still going to try to do something with it at his station house; contact people and maybe get something informally done.

Lt. O'Mary stated that he believes if this protocol is put into place with everyone supporting it, the DA will start filing on people who refuse to leave, especially after numerous resources have been offered them.

Councilwoman Garcia asked about the attempted kidnap of the little girl in Pittsburg on Crivello, and if there were any updates, and Lt. O'Mary stated he had spoken with a Lt. from Pittsburg last week and as of that date they had nothing new.

c. Supervisor Federal Glover's General Report – Mr. Ed Diokno

- Mr. Diokno stated Supervisor Glover finished holding his four town hall meetings in unincorporated areas. He stated the supervisor will now move on to have town halls for the cities in District V.
- Mr. Diokno stated the Keller Canyon Bidders Conference was held April 30th; that if you didn't attend you won't be able to apply for a grant. He stated Keller Canyon applications are due May 20th, 5:00pm, and interviews begin in June.
- Mr. Diokno stated they are taking applications for internships for Supervisor Glover's office. He stated the internship gives an inside look at government and public service. Mr. Diokno stated applicants need to be a high school senior in the coming fall; to send resumes and cover letters to their office. He stated this is the 5th year they've had the internship program and a lot of the students who went through it are just graduating from college.

There were some questions and Mr. Diokno stated it was a 6 weeks program, 20 hours a week; and they plan on having 2 sessions over the summer. He stated besides the experience, the biggest advantage is having it on their application for college.

d. Golden State Water Company – Mr. Paul Schubert

6. Presentations Presentations were made by:

a. PG&E Shell Pond Update – Ms. Tracy Craig

Ms. Tracy Craig stated that you can see by just looking that there isn't a lot of work going on at the pond, however they are still committed to working with Bay Point, still picking up litter along Port Chicago Hwy., and looking for educational opportunities for the local schools to make sure they know the importance of the wetlands in their own back yard. She stated they are of course re-evaluating to find new approach for the project.

Ms. Craig introduced Mr. Ben LaPage, who has a doctorate in geology, and been with PG&E for about 6 months; hasn't replaced Mr. Bob Gray, but he is Mr. Gray's boss, and she wanted to introduce him to the community and have him share an update. Ms. Craig stated they will continue to come to meetings and let people know what they are doing.

Mr. Ben LaPage introduced himself as the new Remediation Manager at PG&E, arriving from Philadelphia where he was for 20 years; coming from the Philadelphia Electric Co. where he did the same work he is doing here. He stated one of projects he has is the Shell Pond, and it has been an interesting trip; what they are doing is looking and re-evaluating options and different approaches to clean up the contaminants in the pond in a way that makes sense. Mr. LePage stated they wanted it to benefit the community, not stink everyone out, and be environmentally friendly. He stated they have looked at and presented an option to the Department of Toxic Substance Control (DTSC) and they approved the Pilot Test for using plants to kill the contaminants; as a wetlands scientist he likes to think he had a little something to do with that. He stated "nature does what we do, a little bit better". Mr. LePage stated he hoped to provide a sustainable, green approach. He stated this summer we will see a little activity going on at the Shell Pond site, installing some test spots to run some pilots, taking some samples; they want to make sure this works.

Mr. Ben LaPage stated he has spoken with his colleagues who are wetland scientists in the western chapter of the Society of Wetlands Scientists, who are interested in getting involved to develop a program with the schools, long-term, small, but something they can build on, and help the local schools get the kids on site (let them get their hands dirty), to teach them a little bit about what the wetlands are and their benefits. He stated he has colleagues from Sacramento University trying to get some grad students involved with the research too. Mr. LePage reiterated they are committed to the project, and doing it in a way that is good for the community and the environment.

Councilwoman Zumwalt asked about the time frame for this type of clean-up and what do they do with the plants when they've done their job. Mr. LePage stated they plants they are installing is to see how long the process is for the plants roots to break the hydrocarbons down and the plants to eat that. He stated they will also be running some lab studies under greenhouse conditions which will provide a better idea how long; but in the published literature scientists are finding 5 – 10 years. Mr. LePage stated the plants should not have to be removed, but they are testing to make sure there are no contaminants detrimental to the environment.

b. Habitat for Humanity Bay Point Pride – Ms. Leslie Palaroan

Chairman Tremaine stated for a long time Bay Point Pride took care of the graffiti abatement, and Habitat for Humanity would like to help in getting it started again.

Ms. Leslie Palaroan stated she wanted to give an update on the Pacifica project, that she wasn't here last month when they made the presentation, but they are planning on submitting the planning approval by the end of this month; talking to their architects and engineers now about how everything is going to fit on the property nicely; just moving the park that was at the Driftwood corner to inside the development, moving kids away from the intersection.

Ms. Palaroan then shared a PowerPoint presentation on their Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative, leading into Bay Point Pride including:

- Large project in April at Bel Air Elementary school, with 60 volunteers (kids, parents, teachers, and staff) to install privacy slats in chain-link fence along trail, painted tether-ball poles, and created outdoor reading area by library,
- Recognizing group of 'Regulars' and 'Women's Crew' whom most are skilled, retired, Contra Costa resident who volunteer for Habitat.
- Ambrose Center improvement work in April, with 45 volunteers (Pittsburg HS, 'People Who Care', San Francisco State, the Women's Crew, residents, staff, and more) to paint lower walls of Auditorium, the bathrooms, lines in the parking lot, and picked up trash on center grounds.
- Upcoming projects - 1) in May to clean up and paint Ambrose Park, 2) Unity in Community, 3) Adopt-a-Road along Canal and include trail so kids can help too.

There was a discussion about a group of people taking care of the trail and graffiti on the wall behind the trail; who they were and how to contact them.

Ms. Palaroan stated now Habitat is here and they are trying to do the Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative, the community projects, having the Bay Point Vision which is neighborhood beautification, youth and recreation and youth and education; trying to have those ideas from the community guide them and figure what projects they do and do not want to work on. She stated they are interested in tackling neighborhood blight, forming a community group to make sure their homeowners thrive in Bay Point; she met Carol and Wayne Watkins who want to head the neighborhood beautification committee.

There was a discussion regarding the origins, past work, and present work and workers of the Bay Point Pride.

Ms. Palaroan stated she and Mr. & Mr. Watkins have been trying to figure out their priorities, and wouldn't it be great to tap into the Bay Point Pride and enhance their efforts on beautifying Bay Point.

Councilman Stevenson stated Ms. Palaroan could contact him and he would give her Mr.

Loraine Harms phone number who does the remaining Bay Point Pride project, ‘Yard of the Month’.

Chairman Tremaine stated we should all thank Ms. Palaroan; as since she has been working in our community through Habitat, coming to Code and MAC meetings, she’s really taken a hold and an interest in our Bay Point community and its residents.

8. Election and swearing in of 2013 MAC Officers; Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer

There was a short discussion regarding swearing in of new members and/or officers.

Chairman Tremaine read the duties for each Board Officer’s position, explained that these positions were for the remainder of this year, and opened the floor for nominations:

Councilwoman Eva Garcia nominated Councilman Tremaine for Chair; was seconded by Councilwoman Hudson. Nomination approved 7 – 0.

Councilwoman Zumwalt nominated Councilwoman Mason for Vice Chair; was seconded by Councilwoman Hudson. Nomination approved 7 – 0.

Councilwoman Tremaine nominated Councilwoman Eva Garcia for Treasurer; seconded by Councilwoman Lupe Garcia. Nomination approved 7 – 0

Councilwoman Mason nominated Councilwoman Hudson for Secretary; seconded by Councilwoman Zumwalt. Nomination approved 7 – 0.

Mr. Diokno swore in the new officers.

9. Committee Reports The MAC received the following reports:

a. CAP – Councilwoman Mason

Councilwoman Mason stated the meeting was at General Chemical. She stated that as most had probably already heard, Henkel had an injury that resulted in death and they reported they are doing everything they need to cooperate with OSHA and the proper authorities to find the root cause, and the Manager Dave has brought in grief counselors for the other staff. Councilwoman Mason stated ironically the presentation by General Chemical was about human error and how easy it is to take things for granted and make mistakes; the importance of management going out and constantly staying on top of things.

Councilwoman Lupe Garcia stated she wanted to add that she was impressed with way they handled the incident; taking care of the work family by bringing in the grief counseling and closing down the plant for two days. She stated she was very proud of how they really took responsibility in taking care of their work family.

b. Code Enforcement – Chairman Tremaine

Chairman Tremaine stated they had talked about the problem at the corner of Bella Vista, and are working on some plans along with other plans on how to solve problems like this. He stated that this particular area does not have coverage by the Adopt-a-Road program.

c. Adopt a Road – Councilman Stevenson

Councilman Stevenson stated they have one group, Love-a-Child, that has committed to, but not completed the paper work on, taking Willow Pass Road starting at Anuta Park and going all the way to Loftus; that includes the Bella Vista corner that is a problem. He stated they are also considering Canal West, Bailey to Willow Pass; but they have been unable to connect lately.

Councilman Stevenson stated the other group that has shared some interest is the Bay Point Church, who are willing to take Willow Pass, from Port Chicago to Evora, up to the first street, Pomo. He stated he hasn't given them any paper work yet so they can start filling it out. Councilman Stevenson stated these are 2 potential additional groups.

There was a lively discussion regarding an existing group already cleaning up Evora, how other groups want to do that area, and how there are plenty of other areas that could use the attention.

Also discussed was the need for more than just trash pick-up to take care of the problem on the corner of Bella Vista and Willow Pass Rd.

Councilman Tremaine finished his Code Report stating that most of the rest of the meeting was concerning different jurisdictions and different groups, and their responsibilities. He stated they also talked about the recent creek clean-up and another creek clean-ups going forward.

Mr. Mark Sullivan stated he and Councilwoman Mason had worked on Code Enforcement for years, and he had a question. He stated he had called Code Enforcement about a couple of issues, most importantly about cars parking on lawns/yards, and that it is against the law in California; but the Code officer treated him poorly like he didn't know what he was talking about.

There was a discussion regarding jurisdiction of this issue being shared by Code Enforcement and Sheriff's Dept., and how loss of staff has affected their ability to take care of everything like they used to, and not Sheriff's jurisdiction if it is on private

property.

d. Schools – Councilwoman Mason

Councilwoman Mason stated at last night's School Board meeting they did approve the boundary changes for Delta View elementary school, and they are now going through the process of doing an address verification; all the parents to come prove they live in that attendance area. She stated when they've done this in the past at other schools, they've found anywhere from 70 – 100 kids were in schools where they weren't supposed to be.

Councilwoman Mason asked if the crossing guards weren't paid from Keller Funds, as she's like them to add one additional crossing guard at Bailey Rd. because of the increase of kids walking from behind Ambrose to Bel Air, many from De Anza Gardens.

Mr. Diokno stated they were paid from Keller, and asked if there wasn't also going to be an increase at Willow Pass Rd. too.

Councilwoman Mason stated that had been debated at the meeting too, and they're hoping that maybe the school district will approve a bus for the kids traveling all the way from Water Street.

Councilwoman Mason stated the other thing brought up at the meeting by Ms. Linda Mayo, saying in the past they have worked with cities, but they would be working with county public works, to see if they could do anything; that what had been done in Concord during busy crossing times was adjust the timers on the lights to accommodate the kids getting across the street.

Mr. Diokno stated Mr. Jerry Fahy had another position now, that it would be Mr. Chris Lau to contact and ask.

Councilwoman Mason stated if the Council was comfortable with it, she would like to contact him and just explore the possibility.

10. Members' Reports

Councilwoman Zumwalt requested that Keller Canyon be placed back on the agenda as she will be attending a Keller meeting on May 20th, and then interviews will begin early June.

Chairman Tremaine stated that probably the hardest job that anyone can undertake is what Councilwoman Zumwalt does with the Keller Canyon committee.

Councilwoman Eva Garcia stated the newsletter is almost done, will be sending it to Mr. Diokno in the next few days and will soon after be available on the website.

Councilwoman Eva Garcia reminded everyone about the Neighborhood Clean-up on Saturday, May 25th between 8:00am and noon, and that Pittsburg Disposal service is

providing the dumpsters for this date.

Councilwoman Eva Garcia also reminded everyone about the upcoming Bay Point Spring Derby on Memorial Day, May 27th.

There was a short discussion regarding what items will and will not be accepted to be dumped on the clean-up date, and that this information can be found too on the last page of the newsletter.

Councilwoman Eva Garcia stated she wanted to address the problem Mr. Sullivan shared, that she'd had a couple of people complain to her about a similar issue awhile back that was occurring behind the restaurant in Shore Acres; and they too have basically just received lip service when they'd contacted Code Enforcement, and not really gotten help or direction. Councilwoman Garcia stated we shouldn't have to beg for services that our Keller Canyon funds are paying a good chunk for.

Councilwoman Zumwalt stated it was her understanding that the General Manager from the Park District had resigned, and was wondering if that is the case, could Supervisor Glover ask the Park Board if the MAC could have some input about the next General Manager during interviews; maybe include too a member from the community, to be a part of the process.

Mr. Diokno replied that the Supervisor is planning on meeting with one of the Board Members.

Councilwoman Hudson stated that she had participated at the Ambrose clean-up with Habitat, and that it was really a great day, a lot of people showed up to participate, and they really got a lot done. She stated that today she had worked with the Water Shed project to do the creek survey of Riverside drainage, and there are many good people there that are excited about cleaning our waterways. Councilwoman Hudson stated this was an initial study that they do, down to the finest detail they document trash so they can come up with a plan on how they are going to go forward at that particular drain, and then they will do this to each other drain.

Mr. Diokno suggested they might ask the Water Shed project to come to a MAC meeting and make a presentation on what they are doing.

Ms. Palaroan asked if the Water Shed project would be contracting out to recycle people, or are they going to have another volunteer job.

Councilwoman Hudson stated that was a great question because it is partly both, that the survey had been done with volunteers, and there are some items that they couldn't handle, so they do contract out with a recycling company that brings in young people and pays them a small stipend to take care of the heavy stuff; tons of it.

Chairman Tremaine stated he wanted to make some appointments including:

- Councilwoman Lupe Garcia to report on CAP meeting, with Councilwoman Hudson backing her up.
- Councilwoman Zumwalt reporting on the work done for Keller Canyon funds.
- Councilwoman Mason continues to report on schools
- Councilman Stevenson continues to report on Adopt-a-Road
- Chairman Tremaine continues to report on Code Enforcement

Councilwoman Garcia asked that she be placed on the agenda to report on finances.

11. Correspondence.

Chairman Tremaine reviewed and made available for public viewing the following correspondence:

There was a short discussion regarding how correspondence is received and handled in explanation to new Secretary Hudson's question.

There was also a question about email addresses and contact information of Council members, and Councilwoman Garcia stated she would put together a new rooster and email it to all the members.
